## Did you know?

### NEWBURGH FREE LIBRARY ADVOCACY IN ACTION



As the Central Library for the Ramapo Catskill Library System, the Newburgh Free Library has a special obligation to serve both the people of our community as well as library users in our region, and to take the lead in advocating for libraries, intellectual freedom, and literacy all across New York State. When more people have more access to more books, resources, and services our communities become stronger, richer places to live.

With technological change occurring with increasing rapidity, libraries are tasked with keeping pace. One of the most challenging aspects that libraries must contend with in our new digital lives is meeting the demand for eBooks and eAudiobooks. Publishers and platforms charge significantly more for eBooks and eAudiobooks than print copies of the same book. To compound the problem, libraries are not able to own these digital objects, instead licensing them under costly and unsustainable terms. It is a problem that has the potential of undermining public libraries' abilities to build, control, and make accessible public collections now and into the future.

This past year, the Newburgh Free Library has been instrumental in organizing New York's public libraries to push back against these unsustainable licensing models. Library Director, Ben Gocker, presented testimony to the New York State Assembly Standing Committee on Libraries and Education Technology underscoring the need for a new approach to building digital collections. And in February, a team of Newburgh library workers visited Albany and met with State representatives to advocate for all that libraries do for their local communities, as well as for the larger world of library lovers.

### OVER 1200 STUDENTS GO ON COLLEGE VISITS

The district is invested in exposing our scholars to college and career opportunities. This year alone, more than 1200 elementary, middle, and high school scholars have visited 30 colleges throughout New York State to immerse themselves in college life for a tour, learn about requirements, and better understand how to prepare for these future possibilities.

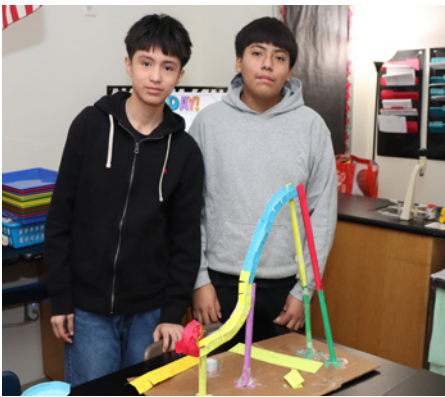

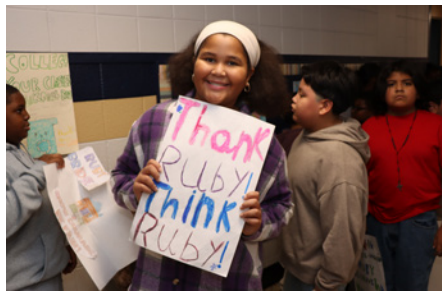
## HERITAGE MIDDLE SCHOOL SCHOLARS CREATE ROLLER COASTERS

## NFA ALUMNI DRs. COOK PROMOTE DENTAL HEALTH & HYGIENE

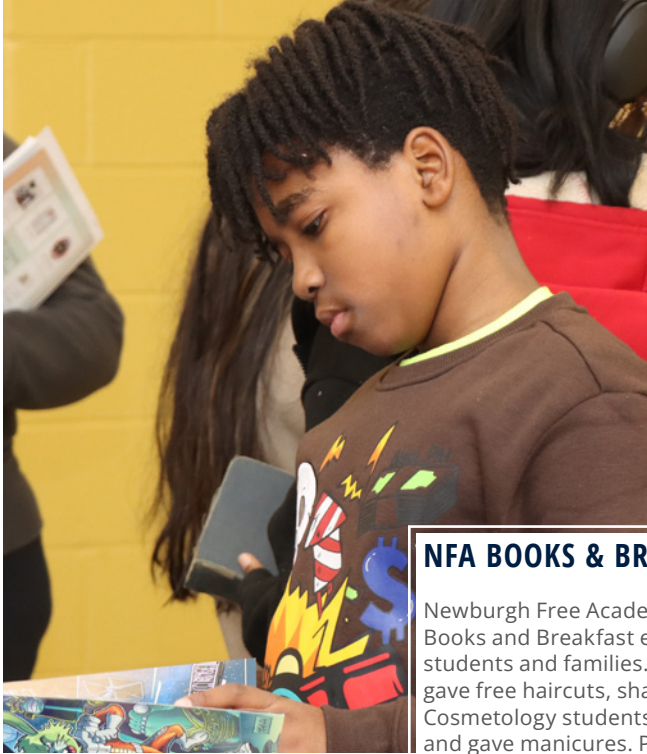

### NFA P-TECH SENIORS SECURE NATIONAL VICTORY IN AI INNOVATION CHALLENGE

Five seniors from the Newburgh Free Academy P-TECH program have achieved a historic victory as one of only ten teams nationwide to win the U.S. Department of Education's CTE Momentum AI Challenge. Their innovative project, Your T.E.A.M. (Therapeutic Enhanced AI Monitor), utilizes wearable technology and smart devices to provide physical therapists with objective, real-time data to improve patient recovery and safety. Developed in collaboration with local healthcare professionals, the system features AI-driven tools like pressure-sensing walkers and real-time coaching assistants to bridge the gap between clinical visits and home rehabilitation. This prestigious win highlights the success of the P-TECH partnership between the district, IBM, and SUNY Orange, as these scholars prepare to graduate with both their high school diplomas and Associate degrees in just four years. Mrs. Christine Baumann, worked closely with the team of students and acted as the Lead Teacher for the competition.



### DEVELOPING STUDENTS AS FUTURE TEACHERS

High School students are earning college credits from SUNY Orange and Mount Saint Mary College while exploring the teaching career path. Each week, students use the skills they've learned right in an elementary classroom, by walking to Gidney Avenue Memorial School (GAMS) to facilitate a lesson, providing a valuable learning experience for both levels of students. This program is taught by Mrs. Kate Sinnott.

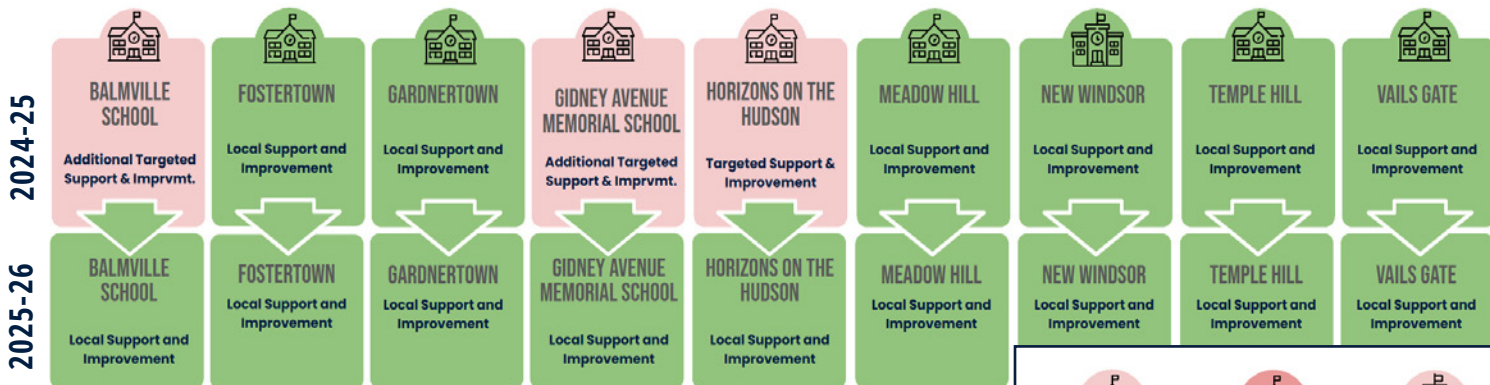

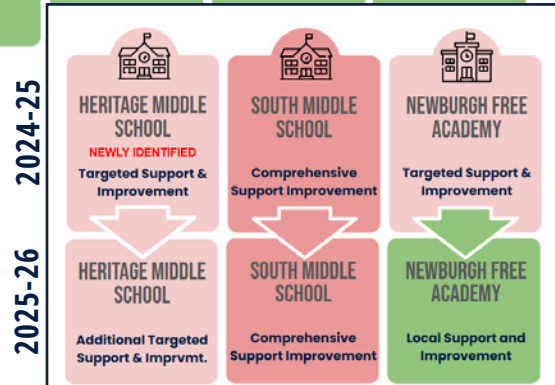
### IN GOOD STANDING

For the first time in more than **ten years**, **all elementary and K-8 school buildings in our district are in good standing**, receiving local support, according to New York State's Accountability System. We know that there is still work to do and milestones of success that we still want to achieve; however, it is important to celebrate our achievements where we can - and this is a big achievement!



These measurements include:

- Student average achievement;
- Core subject performance;
- English language learners proficiency;
- Student growth (for elementary and middle schools);
- attendance index;
- College, Career, and Civic Readiness (for high schools); and
- Graduation rate (for high schools)



### STRONG COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

Strong community partnerships extend learning beyond the classroom by connecting students with local businesses, nonprofits, and civic groups. These collaborations provide mentorship, career opportunities, and social support, creating a shared commitment to student success.

Through Community **Call to Action meetings**, local organizations helped launch Neon Nights—weekly Friday events offering students safe, engaging spaces to socialize and learn at locations like the library, pool, and community centers.

Partnerships with the **Kiwanis Club of Newburgh** and the **United Brain Association** have introduced Bike Gardens for safe riding practice and free swimming lessons for young children. The **Greater Newburgh Parks Conservancy** has enhanced school grounds with gardens and will offer hands-on student programs this spring.

The district is also working with **New York State Senator Rob Rolison** on initiatives to bring additional resources to support students and their success.



## CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS ARE BACK ON TRACK

After a three-year delay, the **Newburgh Free Academy Career and Technical Education (CTE) Center** is set to open in September 2026 under the leadership of Dr. Jackielyn Manning Campbell. This state-of-the-art facility will offer 17 programs that combine traditional vocational training with professional skills, preparing students for careers, college, and lifelong success.

Alongside the new CTE center, the district has completed and advanced major facility upgrades. Highlights include a fully renovated **NFA locker room**, expanded and improved spaces at **Heritage Middle School** and **Vails Gate STEAM Academy**, and ongoing construction at **New Windsor Elementary**. Infrastructure improvements—such as **HVAC upgrades, air conditioning installations, electrical enhancements, and sustainability initiatives**—are underway or completed across multiple schools.

These efforts modernize learning environments, support student needs, and position the district for future growth, including potential evening programs for adult learners.



### NFA NEW CTE CENTER

In September 2026, the Newburgh Enlarged City School District will be proud to open a brand-new Career and Technical Education Center—designed to bring many of our CTE programs together under one roof.

This building has been planned since the public approved the district's capital bond proposal in 2019. However, due to Covid and leadership changes, the project had been stalled. When our current superintendent joined the district in 2022, she made it a priority to get the building back on track!



### NFA LOCKER ROOMS

Complete renovation of entire space, unveiled and now open for our student-athletes, visitors, coaches, and referees with ample lockerroom space, bathrooms, showers, and laundry facility. (Completed Winter 2025)

## LITERACY THROUGHOUT THE DISTRICT

Literacy is the foundation of all learning, empowering students to reach their potential, think critically, and communicate effectively. Helping students become strong readers requires a collective effort across schools and families.

This year, the district introduced several initiatives to promote literacy. The **Drop Everything and Read (DEAR)** program encourages students and families to read for at least 15 minutes daily, boosting vocabulary and long-term academic success. To further celebrate reading, every PreK-12 student received a book.

The Board of Education also launched a **monthly reading initiative**, visiting classrooms to read aloud and connect with students. Each month focuses on themes like communication, civic engagement, and cultural awareness, helping build vocabulary, confidence, and curiosity.

Additionally, the district implemented **Scholastic Knowledge Libraries** in elementary schools. This research-based resource supports key literacy skills—oral language, phonological awareness, phonics, comprehension, fluency, and vocabulary—aligned with the Science of Reading. Roald Dahl's Tony Award-winning musical, *Matilda*, is one of several literature classics that our students are familiar with. In honor of the show, the NECS D partnered with the **Newburgh Free Library** to offer, live readings of the story leading up to the show, free copies of *Matilda* to take home, and a "golden ticket" to see the show for free! Our **Annual Family Reading Day** took place in April at the Newburgh Free Library welcoming families and community partners to celebrate literacy with games, activities, prizes, and community. This event welcomes our entire community to support a love of reading and life-long learning.

## HUMAN RESOURCES PROCESSES IMPROVED



A school district's greatest strength is its people. The expertise and dedication of everyone—from teachers and administrators to security, custodial, food service, and support staff—create safe, supportive environments where students can thrive. Their ability to connect with students and meet diverse needs turns schools into true learning communities.

Recognizing this, Dr. Manning Campbell has focused on improving hiring systems and timelines to attract top talent. While these changes may seem subtle, they are designed to strengthen professionalism and elevate the district overall and will have a tremendous impact.





## NFA PERFORMED MATILDA FOR SPRING MUSICAL

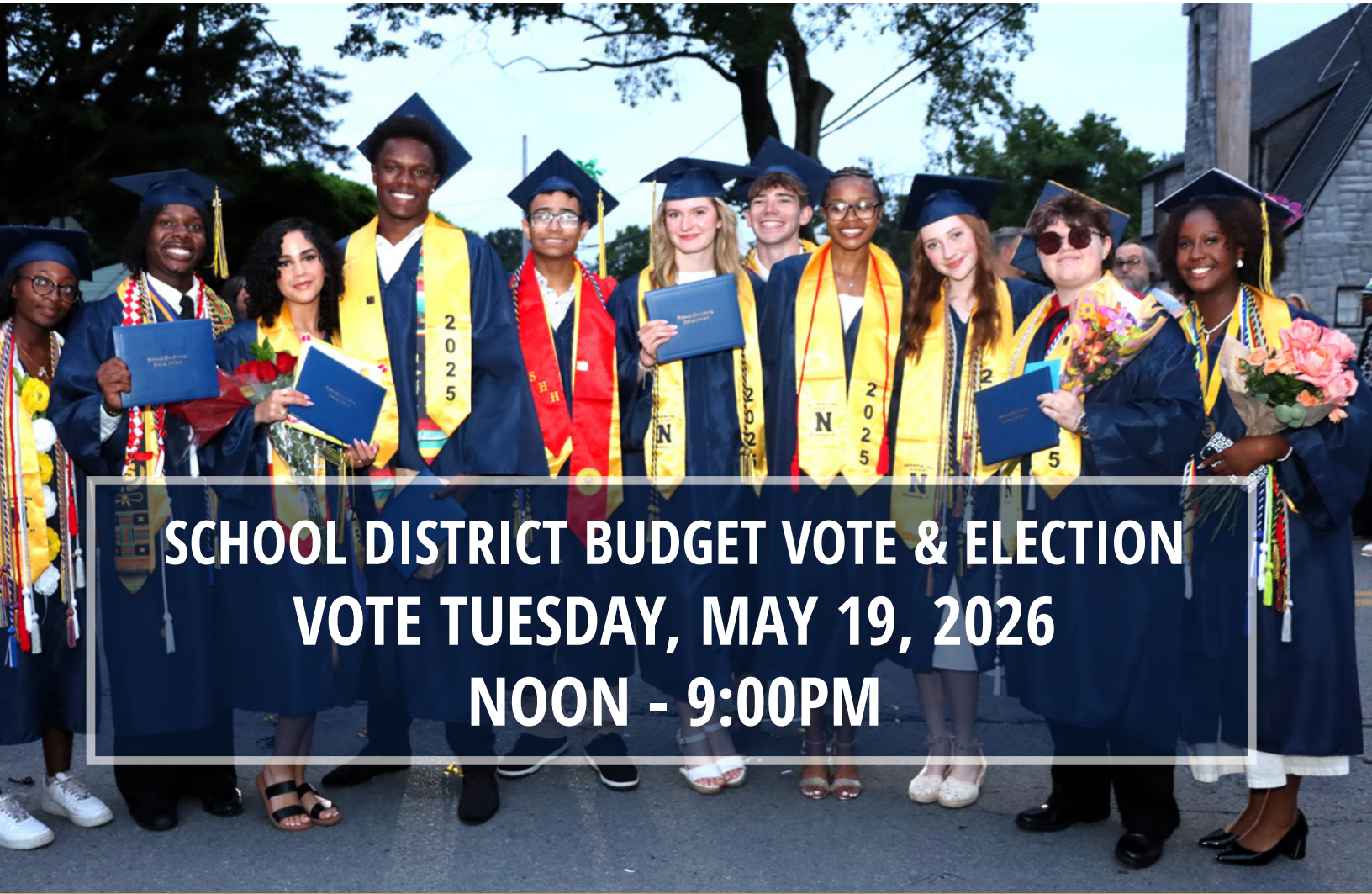
